At these events, community members can bring in their documents for shredding by on-site teams for free or for a nominal fee. Shred-it branches hold their own events or partner with community groups to raise funds for various charitable causes.

What to Bring to a Shred-it Event

Old Financial Documents If not needed for taxes, anything with financial information should be destroyed.

- Shipping Labels Shipping labels can have personal information including names and addresses.
- Photos Photos can be stolen and used for fake identification.
- Ouplicates If information is saved on a computer or another document, copies should be shredded.

What NOT to Bring to a Shred-it Event

X Hard Drives

These require a special destruction process that will not be offered at Community Shred-it Events.

Batteries

Seek guidance from your battery's producer to learn about secure disposal.

Medical Waste

Attend your local Drug Take Back Day event to dispose of pharmaceutical waste and contact your local government to learn about other medical waste disposal options.
